Marshall's law practice includes a broad range of civil litigation topics. He recently shared some information about himself, his career, and thoughts as the incoming FCBA President.

Where did you grow up?

I grew up in Bowling Green, Kentucky. I moved to Lexington as a freshman at U.K., and this has been my home ever since.

Why law school?

Growing up, my father was a personal injury attorney as well as a part time corporate jet pilot for Fruit of the Loom. Originally, I thought I would be a pilot. The jet my father flew had a "jump seat" between the pilots, and my father would sometimes let me tag along. I was the only high school student I knew that occasionally missed school to fly to New York or Miami for day trips.

I started flying single engine planes while an undergraduate student at U.K. and earned my instrument rating. To build flight hours, I started flying a local businessman back and forth to Pikeville, Kentucky, splitting the fuel costs with him. However, I quickly realized that I found flying fun because it was only a hobby, and not a job.

After my junior year at U.K., I spent a summer as a clerk/runner for my father's law firm, Hixson, Downey and Travelstead. I spent most of my time driving Penny Travelstead to depositions and court hearings all over Kentucky and listening to her dictate in the car. I soon realized that law school was the path for me.

What is your best memory of law school?

With my apologies to Pierce Hamblin, I cannot say that taking his litigation skills class was my best law school memory. Instead, my best memory is meeting my wife Jeannie Harrod Hixson in the first class (Property I) on the first day of law

school. Her father, Bob Harrod, was an attorney who, like me, had a "maturing" hair line—so I figured I had a shot.

Who is "we"?

My wife Jeannie, our 13-year-old son Lance, our mini golden doodle Rocky, and myself. The hierarchy in my household is simple—Rocky is squarely in charge and I'm usually in a tie for last place.

What has been the best and hardest part of practicing law for you?

The best part is the variety of topics that I get to address every day. I have always been blessed with a diverse litigation practice spread throughout Kentucky and the rest of the country. On any given week, I could be anywhere in Kentucky dealing with anything from a faulty product, to an environmental spill, to the ownership of a thoroughbred horse. I once even represented a man who confused his nephew for a turkey and accidentally shot him. Fortunately, no turkeys or nephews died that day.

The hardest part has been turning off my "lawyer brain" and mindset before going home, and not allowing clients' problems to become my problems. This is a common challenge for our profession.

After practicing 20 years, what advice would you give Marshall the first year attorney?

Do not forfeit your reputation for any client and just relax. When I look back at the most successful attorneys I have worked with over the last 20 years, they are universally civil to each other and do not need to pound on the table or play games get their points across. I wish I had learned these lessons much earlier in my career.

What are your goals for the Fayette County Bar Association for the upcoming year?

I want every member and prospective member of our bar to recognize that there is real value to being part of the legal community and the FCBA. Additionally, I want to continue promoting the social side of the FCBA. I welcome input from any member about how we can better serve them.



New Opportunities

Legal Aid of the Bluegrass relies on the private bar and its dedicated attorneys to help meet the legal needs of vulnerable people in our community. In the past, we have primarily referred pro bono divorce cases to the domestic relations section of the bar. Our current

focus is to expand the types of cases that we refer. We have already placed several Ch. 7 bankruptcy cases and continue to find volunteer attorneys to help victims of the Eric Conn SSDI redetermination hearings. Our next opportunity to volunteer is a Wills Clinic in collaboration with the FCBA at the Lexington Senior Center on Thursday, July 3. We need volunteer attorneys to assist Kentucky seniors in preparing their wills, living wills, and POAs. This will be a wonderful opportunity to assist elder clients establish their medical and financial plans for the future.

If you are interested in volunteering for our program but do not have expertise in civil legal cases, we can help. With funding from the Kentucky Bar Foundation, Legal Aid of the Bluegrass is hosting a series of Legal Aid University sessions on civil legal topics. Each session provides you substantive training but also equips you with information on local expectations and procedures. This is a great opportunity to learn about civil legal practice areas, meet other legal professionals, and sign up to volunteer. Our next Legal Aid University CLE is on June 20th and will focus on SSI/SSDI benefits. Attorneys who attend this training will be encouraged to accept an SSDI case for the victims of Eric Conn's scheme.

Fayette Family Court Annouces F.I.T. Program

The Fayette Co. "Families in Transition" staff will hold divorce education classes each month for those parents ordered to attend "Keller's Kids" (Parent Education). For all cases with children ages 6-14, the parties shall register to personally attend the F.I.T. program. They will have 30 days from the receipt of the Order to register by one of three methods:

Attendance: Parents will be normally assigned to separate classes. Either parent may bring the children to F.I.T. classes (assuming this does not contradict any court orders regarding contact/custody). Parents should jointly make this decision before they call to schedule.

Cost: The fee is \$75.00 per parent. Cash payments only are due when parents register at their first session. There is no fee for children. If the petition was filed in forma pauperis the fee may be reduced.

Certificate: Parents will receive the signed certificates upon completion of course requirements. It will be each

parent's duty to file the certificate into the court record.

Children Classes: Children will meet on weeknights at the same time as the adults in their own classrooms.

Locations: Classes will be held at local Lexington Public Library branch locations, churches, and businesses.

Times and Dates: Weeknight classes open at 5:30 p.m. for registration. Classes will be held from 6 p.m. to 8:00 p.m. These classes require you to attend two nights. Parents and their children may attend weeknight classes.

Saturday classes will open for parents' registration at 9:45 a.m. Class time is 10:00 a.m.- 2:15 p.m. (includes short Lunch Break). No Children's Classes on SATURDAYS! This class is for PARENTS only.

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College of Law Trial Team Finishes in Final Four at National Competition

Two students on the University of Kentucky College of Law Trial Team finished as one of the top four teams in the nation at the National Trial Competition (NTC) in Austin, Texas.

The NTC was established in 1975 to encourage and strengthen students' advocacy skills through quality competition and valuable interaction with members of the bench and bar. The program is co-sponsored by the American College of Trial Lawyers and is designed to expose law students to the nature of trial practice and to serve as a supplement to their education.

The Texas Young Lawyers Association (TYLA) presents the annual competition, which attracts teams from more than 140 law schools and involves more than 1,000 law students each year. The goal is to provide a meaningful contribution to the development of future trial lawyers. The competition is the most prestigious law school trial competition in the nation.

Third-year student Caleb Taylor and second-year student Matt Boggs, along with teammates Maddie Moss and Vince Taormina, competed against 22 teams at regionals held in Knoxville, Tennessee. Taylor and Boggs clenched first place. Then, the team received a new trial problem. They had less than five weeks to prepare both sides of the case. The top 30 teams competed at nationals where Taylor and Boggs continued to excel.

The students practiced four times a week, including Saturdays and Sundays, and even prepared over Spring Break. Their fellow teammates, Moss and Taormina, were their opponents at every practice and helped them reach the high level of advocacy and evidence law that led them to success. The team was coached by Professor Allison Connelly.

"The work and commitment of many great student advocates brought us to this point. Indeed, all our student advocates have sacrificed a great deal to put our law school in the national spotlight, and they've succeeded," Connelly said. "Not only did Caleb and Matt excel on a national stage, they epitomize the excellence of the college's trial program; a program built on student dedication, sacrifice and persistence. However, I'm even more proud of the way the team of Caleb, Matt, Maddie and Vince, represented our law school. They won and lost with great integrity, professionalism and honor. This

foursome represents the ideal every lawyer strives to achieve."

In a federal courtroom, in front judges and attorneys, compelling arguments would secure Taylor and Boggs a spot in the final four. This is only the second time in 22 years a UK team has reached this level of success in the competition. In addition, Taylor and Boggs will each receive \$750 from the Kansas City, Missouri, law firm of Polsinelli PC.

"I cannot imagine a better way to wrap up my academic career. Mock Trial has always been a huge part of my education. I have a great coach and teammate to thank for our exceptional performance," Taylor said.

"Caleb and I had a great time competing among some of the best student advocates in the country. We were proud to represent the university and the College of Law on a national stage, and to see all the hours of hard work pay off. We had incredible support behind us in our other teammates, Madeline Moss and Vince Taormina, and our unparalleled coach, Professor Connelly," Boggs said.

Since 1998, UK Law's trial teams have achieved a national reputation. In 22 years, they have won the American College regional competition 11 times and have been named five times as one of the top 16 trial teams in the country by the National Institute of Trial Advocacy.

The Canaan House/FCBA Connection

Have you ever stayed to the end of one of the many FCBA receptions, CLEs, and social events that go on through the year and happen to see Judge Kim Bunnell collecting the food leftovers?

Yep, that's her... spooning cheese dips, bagging sandwiches, dumping chips into a bag and layering cookies and desserts into some kind of make-shift containers and then precariously carrying them all to her car. You need not worry that she's running a food truck on the side. She delivers these leftovers to The Canaan House and she reports that the residents absolutely love these random, drop-in buffets.

Beginning as a volunteer in 1995 and becoming president of the Board in 1999, Judge Bunnell is a longtime supporter of the Canaan House, a residential facility in Lexington which provides safe and affordable housing for up to 17 persons with severe mental illness who are at risk of being homeless. There are three homes that provide individual bedrooms and a shared living community. Canaan House offers a stable, personal living arrangement that combines individual attention to residents needs with few restrictions. Residents are encouraged to participate in daily living and house operations as one way to begin taking charge of their lives.

Canaan House, Inc. is privately funded solely through the generous contributions of individual and group sponsors. It does not receive any federal or state funding; however, many of the residents qualify for Section 8 funding.

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

Pled v. Pleaded

The proofreading site "Pain in the English" states:

Pled versus pleaded

Anyone notice the banishment of "pled" about 5 years or so ago? The newspapers used to say "The defendant pled not guilty." Suddenly, everything became "pleaded." I contend that this is an improper imposition of some kind of twisted "grammar correctness," except it is incorrect. "Pled" is a less emotional word than "pleaded". I plead when I am begging for something. Unless the defendant is on his knees weeping, he is not pleading; he is entering a plea. In the past tense, he pled, not pleaded.
